She received her Associate of Fine Arts Degree from Truckee Meadows Community College in Reno, Nevada and a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree from the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Rondee was a Western Shoshone Scholarship Foundation recipient and a Barrick Intern with the Western Shoshone Community Internship Program. Rondee is an aspiring artist with a focus on photography. She is excited about

her new role with Barrick because working with the tribes has always been one of her dreams. Rondee looks forward to spending time in the communities and knows it will also inspire her art.

"I have always wanted to use my education to give back to the Newe people in some way. I believe in progress and want to see the Western Shoshone Tribes become successful and self-sufficient. Visitors took photos and videos of the kids in their regalia, many complimenting the charity of the kids exhibiting their styles.

Nephi Craig, son of the late recording artist, Vincent Craig, spoke at the keynote speech, as well as showed off his culinary skills with traditional foods during the Humanities Talk at Great Basin College. He spoke about the history and oppression of many Native tribes.

As a chef with twenty years of experience, Craig talked about indigenous resurgence through Native foods. He explained that his speech was "about health and revitaliza-





The rights of religious liberty are some of the cornerstones to American history and culture, and are enshrined in the Constitution's First Amendment. Yet few issues have generated such perennial debates and controversies.

Over the last decade, a series of conflicts between religious liberty and issues of equal access and personal choice have spurred serious discussion and legal action. Court cases such as Burwell v. Hobby Lobby, Masterpiece Cakeshop v. Colorado Civil Rights

Commission, Little Sisters of the Poor v. Burwell, and others have raised new concerns about where the boundaries of religious liberty should lie in modern American society. To what extent does religious liberty conflict with federal and state laws on a range of issues, or even personal choices? How should such conflicts be resolved?

The next GBC Talks event will look at the issues these controversies have raise and discuss the role religious liberties play in modern society. Leading the discussion will be short presentations by:

Zach Gerber, Esq. – Partner at Gerber Law Offices, LLP and President of the Great Basin Chapter of the J. Reuben Clark Law Society Dan Du-Soleil – Pastor at the Christian Center of Elko Kevin Hodur, Ph. D. – English Instructor, Great Basin College Following the presentations, the floor will be opened to general discussion to explore these issues together.





tion, basically validating our ancestral intelligence." He spoke several times about how his father, Vincent, was a performer at the gathering, and when he received the invitation he was amazed and gladly accepted the invitation.

During the Humanities talk, Craig said, "tonight we got to meet the Shoshone Language Revitalization group, and I would like to share and commend them on their work so far. It's profoundly important to continue our work on revitalizing our languages, it's just as important as our food revitalization system.

As for his observation of our local participants, Craig said, "they've been very nice, and genuinely inquisitive about asking me questions, I could see the strength, as an indigenous person myself.

Henry Real Bird, from Montana, also attended and performed at the gathering, reciting poetry, and occasionally adding a traditional Native song into the mix.

Buckaroo Stories was also well received. Featuring Joe Blossom and Ted Howard. Old stories about the wild days left few seats empty during the Saturday show. And laughter was not scarce.

Students from the Owyhee Combined School displayed the films that they had developed in 2018 through the Deep West Videos program. Six students created films, with subjects varying from a hometown volleyball championship, to personal lineage through self discovery. This group has been displaying their films for many years.
